Drawing on his globetrotting lifestyle, Jason Bleick, former vice president of design for Quiksilver, founded the company in 2003. "During my travels in countries such as India, Hong Kong, China, Europe, the U.K., Vietnam, Korea, Amsterdam, and Italy, I found so much in the form of art, color, architecture, functionality, and comfort," says Bleick. "I set out to create a brand inspired from all of the natural beauty of our globe—and made out of the best fabrics you can find." Each machine-washable piece—such as the soft and trendy Turkish denim jeans (\$265-\$275)—is constructed with top-quality materials such as Swiss zippers, handmade copper rivets from Italy, and one-of-a-kind fabrics from Japan. Says Lucky Brand founder Gene Montesano—co-owner along with local residents Barry Perlman, Jimmy Argyropoulos, and Trent Merrill—"When I met Jason, I could see he was very humble and passionate about his idea for a travel-inspired, beachy lifestyle brand—we thought Santa Barbara would be a perfect place to start the first Ever store." SHOW ME THE MONEY In the early 1900s, our city churned out currency from the **First National Trust and Savings Bank of Santa Barbara**—personalized monetary notes issued by the Federal Reserve were used for everyday business across the country. In 1913, locally circulated cash was individually ink-signed by the city cashier and the president of the bank. Personalized bills faded out in the 1930s during the Great Depression, but for collectors, the value of these notes begins at \$500. **-KEIRA FITZGIBBON**
